Year 6 Newsletter Spring Term - Half Term 2




Year 6 Curriculum

English this half term revolves around the same World War Il topic with a particular focus on the book 'When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit'. We will be looking carefully at the story and using it as inspiration for much of our writing. As always, we will cover a range of text types from informal letters to descriptive narrative writing.

Within **Maths,** we will be moving the children's learning on to algebra and length conversions. The children will be using concrete materials to help support their understanding and we will have a particular focus on developing the children's reasoning skills to help prepare them for their SATs.

In Science, we will continue to focus on the topic of 'The Circulatory System'. Children will be developing their understanding of the key organs and components which make up the circulatory system while also linking it to the importance of living a healthy life-style. Towards the end of the topic, the children will conduct their very own experiment which will require them to partake in exercise and measure their own heart rates.





We have a very exciting DT topic this half term cooking! The children will look closely at seasonality and rationing during WWII and will use this research to make their very own version of a Sir Woolton Pie. More details about this will follow.

In **Computing,** Mrs Hart will be introducing Micro Bits which is a tiny pocket sized computer. This programmable device allows children to get hands on with coding and digital making.

Within **RE**, we will look at Christianity and the routines and rituals they follow after someone dies. Along with this, the children will study their beliefs about resurrection. This will then be compared to the beliefs held by other religions.



Within **PSHE** lessons, our Year 6 children will be investigating the origins of chocolate and the disparity between the countries that produce and the countries that manufacture the cocoa bean. Woven throughout their learning, the children will learn the importance of fair trade.

Within **PE** this term, the children will be partaking in gymnastics and netball. They will be creating different sequences on apparatus in groups of 6. During netball, they will learn to attack and defend whilst working as a team.



Finally, it may be apparent from our other subjects that WWII remains our overall topic which lends itself nicely to both our **History** and **Geography lessons.** We will be looking at the effects of the Atomic bomb, and making comparisons between the Nazi invasion and the Viking invasion.

Book Recommendations:



Miss Cooper: This term I recommend 'The 1000 Year Old Boy' by Ross Welford. A fantastic story about a boy who can never die, it explores many values that we cherish as a school. Get lost in a whole different world and expect exciting plot twists!

Whilst listening to your child read, focus on the new vocabulary they come across, but also question their understanding of the text – can they find an answer within the text? Can they use the text to help support an idea or an answer to a question you have asked?
