Topic: Unit 4- Christianity; Sacrifice; Sin; Redemption, Atonement, Salvation, Grace	Year 5	Was the death of Jesus worth the sacrifice?
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Knowledge	Vocabulary
<p>Most Christians believe that on the cross Jesus "became sin" or paid the price for the sins of the world.</p> <p>Jesus is described as the lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world .</p> <p>Christians believe that Christ died for a purpose and that He gave his life for others. There are links between the death of Jesus and the Passover lamb and the sacrifices made on the day of Atonement.</p> <p>Jesus had the freedom not to die, but chose to and that the words of forgiveness spoken in the cross can be understood to apply to all humans.</p>	<p>Day of Atonement- also known as Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year in Judaism</p> <p>Good Friday - the Friday before Easter Sunday</p> <p>Passover - the major Jewish spring festival</p> <p>Redemption - being saved from sin</p> <p>Sacrifice - giving up something valued for the sake of something else regarded as more important</p> <p>Salvation - deliverance from sin and its consequences, believed by Christians to be brought about by faith in Christ</p> <p>Sin - action that breaks a religious law</p>
<p>Activities</p> <p>Find out what Christianity teaches about sacrifice - including passages from the Old Testament about the Passover and the Day of Atonement.</p> <p>Look at a picture of Christ on the cross; listen to a song about the death of Jesus; read the Easter Story. Look for connections between the pictures, the music and the story.</p> <p>Explore the lives of others who have made sacrifices - either biblical, historical or from other faiths.</p> <p>Interview a Christian. Do Christians think the death of Jesus was worthwhile?</p> <p>Look at a selection of Good Friday services. What do these services tell us about what Christians believe about the death of Jesus?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •
